

Majors Division

Age Range: The typical age range for players is 10-12, and possibly 9-year-olds that played in AAA the prior year. By rule, all 12 year-olds must play in the Majors division. If you feel that your 12 year-old is not ready or prepared to play in the Majors division, you have the option of signing a waiver that will allow him/her to play in the AAA division.

Tryout: A tryout is held for the Majors division. Each player that attends the tryout will be evaluated on fielding ground balls, fielding fly balls, throwing, and hitting. Players must attend the tryout in order to be eligible for the Majors division.

Draft: A draft is held for the Majors division. Please keep in mind that the Majors division has limited roster spots for “the under 12” age player, since all 12 year olds must play in the Majors unless they elect to play in AAA or do not attend the tryout. This is a Little League rule, which all leagues must follow. The draft is held by the Majors division managers, who determine their selections based on a number of different sources of information. The draft is typically held the week following the tryout and players are notified if they are selected for the Majors division soon after the draft.

Practices: There are typically 2-3 practices per week, held at the discretion of the manager and coaches. Practices will start in March.

Games: The regular season begins in early-to-mid April. There are typically 2-3 games per week and could be scheduled during any day of the week. Rained-out games are made up as soon as possible. There are playoffs at the end of the regular season. Games are competitive with playing time based on skill level and no requirement for equal playing time among the players. However, no player may sit out defensively more than 3 innings in a game (unless the game goes extra innings) and each player must receive at least 1 at-bat. Younger and/or less-skilled players may end up playing the minimum amount.

AAA Division

Age Range: The typical age range for players is 9-11. All 10 and 11 year-olds play in AAA, some 9 year-olds, and possibly some 8-year-olds.

Tryout & Draft: A tryout is held for the AAA division. Players not selected for the Majors division will need to attend the non-Majors tryout. Each player that attends the tryout will be evaluated on fielding ground balls, fielding fly balls, throwing, and hitting. A draft is held for the AAA division. The draft is typically held the week following the tryout and players are notified if they are selected for the AAA division soon after the draft.

Practices: There are typically 2 practices per week, held at the discretion of the manager and coaches. Practices will typically start in late March.

Games: The regular season begins in mid-to-late April. There are typically 2-3 games per week and could be scheduled during any day of the week. Rained-out games are made up as soon as possible. There are playoffs at the end of the regular season. All players bat in a continuous batting order and all players must sit out an inning in the field before any player sits out for a 2nd inning. There are a few division-specific rules that are different than the Majors division.

AA Division

Age Range: The typical age range is 8-9, with possibly some 7-year olds.

Tryout: Players age 7 and up that are not in the Majors division need to attend the non-Majors draft. Those players not selected for the AAA division will be placed in the AA or A division.

Team Placement & Coaches: Teams and coaching staffs will be determined by the Board of Directors, using player ratings from the non-Majors tryout session, with the intention of formulating balanced and competitive teams.

Practices: There are typically 1-2 practices per week, held at the discretion of the manager and coaches. Practices will typically start in late March or early April.

Games: The regular season begins in mid-to-late April. There are typically 2 games per week and could be scheduled during any day of the week. Rained-out games are made up as soon as possible. There are playoffs at the end of the regular season. All players bat in a continuous batting order and all players must sit out an inning in the field before any player sits out for a 2nd inning. There are a few division-specific rules that are different than the Majors and AAA divisions.

A Division

Age Range: The typical age range is 6-7 years old.

Team Placement & Coaches: Teams and coaching staffs will be determined by the Board of Directors.

Practices: There is typically 1 practice per week, held at the discretion of the manager and coaches. Practices will typically start in early April.

Games: The regular season begins in mid-to-late April. There are typically 1-2 games per week and they are usually on the weekend days. Rained-out games are made up as soon as possible. Scores are not kept and there are no playoffs. The division is primarily instructional. All players bat in a continuous batting order. There are a few division-specific rules that are different than the older divisions.

T-Ball

Age Range: The typical age range is 4-5 years old.

Team Placement & Coaches: Teams and coaching staffs will be determined by the Board of Directors.

Practices: There could be 1 practice per week, held at the discretion of the manager and coaches. Practices will typically start in early-to-mid April.

Games: The regular season begins in mid-to-late April. There is only 1 game per week and they are on the weekend days. Rained-out games are made up as soon as possible. Scores are not kept and there are no playoffs. The division is primarily instructional. All players bat in a continuous batting order. There are a few division-specific rules that are different than the older divisions.
