2004 Annual Meeting Report (Presented on Nov 16, 2004)

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President's Report (David Westbrook)

This year WWPSA ventured into new territory with spring recreational youth soccer run by parent volunteers, summer pick up games and adult soccer. All three of these new programs were more successful than we anticipated.

The fall programs continue to be the main stay of the Association. This fall saw 480 youth travel players, 1,623 youth recreational players, 72 adult recreational players and 20 players on our first adult representative team. We also had 243 travel soccer teams participate in our 10th Annual Sunburst Tournament.

At this time I would like to thank:

- The players who participate with gusto and vigor and who make this all worthwhile.
- The 457 volunteer coaches and board members for all their efforts in coaching, administering and helping the players enjoy themselves.
- The parents for their willingness to volunteer to do whatever needed doing, and for driving the players back and forth.
- Sarnoff Corporation, West Windsor – Plainsboro Board of Education, and Plainsboro and West Windsor Townships for allowing us to use of their fields, lining and maintaining the fields.

We awarded 3 scholarships to 2004 graduating seniors in recognition of their support of both the soccer community and the community in general. Congratulations to Constantine (Dean) Pangalos, Joanna Todd and Matthew Charette.

In response to comments received last year we introduced a \$50 non-volunteer fee per family and gave parents the option to either volunteer or pay the \$50. This seemed to work extremely well and throughout this year we have had no lack of volunteers to do the work needed to run our various programs.

We have also started the process of looking the current WWPSA bylaws and structure with the intent to revise them to reflect how the Association is run and to arrange its affairs in a more effective and efficient manner. To that end we have as a first step drafted a proposed constitution for the Association which will be considered at the annual general meeting.

Of the field front things are moving forward slowly. Our most critical need continues to be the lack of lighted practice fields which I hope we will address in the coming year.

Parking and traffic problems were largely non-existent this year. Spectator and player behavior were also much improved with only a few reported incidents of inappropriate behavior. I thank you all for helping us in this regard and know we will continue our success, as long as we remember we are doing this so our players can have fun playing soccer in a safe and pleasant environment.

Finance (Pat Trombetta)

The Association remains in a strong financial position. For the year ended 2003 our operating revenue was \$187,000, operating expenses were \$140,000 and \$30,000 was transferred to our Field and Capital Development Fund leaving a net surplus of \$17,000. This surplus allowed us to keep 2004 registration fees at the same level as 2003 and we expect to have a much smaller surplus at the end of 2004. Our 2003 Sunburst Tournament generated a net surplus of \$12,000 excluding the \$13,000 in discount coupons issue due to the rain out of the 2003 tournament.

Our 2004 year to date net is \$218,000 with expenses incurred of \$143,000. Additional expenses estimated at around \$30,000 for referees, trophies, photographs, group training still need to be finalized and paid. We also need to calculate the 2004 transfer to the Field and Capital Development Fund which should be in the region of \$40,000.

Our 2004 Sunburst tournament had revenues of \$101,000 and expenses of \$74,000, generating a net surplus of \$27,000, the majority of which will be transfer to the Field and Capital Development Fund.

Adult Soccer Programs (Robin Dean)

Almost 75 adults registered for the Fall Recreational League, a good number despite a late start for registrations. In addition, another 20 players joined together to form WWPSA's first adult representative team - the Wasps - playing in the Mercer League. With this basis, the outlook for the spring is very positive. Player interest remains high. Thanks to Sarnoff for their generosity in providing fields for the program.

Background Checks (Bernadine Williams)

We appreciated the cooperation and patience of the coaches as we continue our Background Checks policy and NJYS Kid Safe program. Thank you to the West Windsor Community Policing Unit and Plainsboro Pro Cop Unit for fingerprinting many coaches. This year we also started the process of verifying that the training organizations we use conduct appropriate background checks of their staff.

Equipment (Larry White)

This year the Kinder, First and Second leagues were switched to the new uniforms. Now all leagues have the new uniforms from SCORE American Soccer. Clipboards and hand pumps were included in all equipment bags. Two corner flags were also given each team, 3rd grade and above. Sports Junction lettered all of our sponsorship jerseys. Many of them had logos. All sponsors were given a complimentary lettered jersey. Jerseys were supplied to the adult soccer team and equipment bags were made up for 13 travel teams. 1716 uniforms and 396 coach's jerseys were

distributed to 130 recreation league teams this past year. We had an enthusiastic group of volunteers this year that helped pack, recollect, and sort our equipment bags.

Facilities (John Rowland)

Looking back on last years report we mention two deficits facing the Association. Lit practice fields and quality of existing ones. I'm glad to report that we made several strides towards correcting these shortcomings.

Sometime in late August, approximately 30 volunteers took on the project to restore WWCP back to playable condition. Which we will eternally be grateful. Under careful planning and insight this fall we were able to keep out of the goal mouths and allow these areas to heal. Both fields should be ready for play next year.

This year we also undertook the regular schedule maintenance for WWCP, Zaitz and Conover. Which included aeration, fertilization, liming, and seeding and weed control. The increase in cost will be outweighed by the benefits to the fields in the long run.

We implement a more micromanagement of practice times and facilities. Although we continued to have mechanic problems with the lights at Zaitz. We offer 30 extra slots per week at Plainsboro Community Park. Several coaches took us up on these slots. While others insisted on Zaitz. We were able to accommodate all requests.

Finally we purchased a latex paint field liner and two sets of European style goals. The liner will decrease our dependence on both townships as they come under budget constraints.

Looking forward we will have new fields at Conover "Great Lawn" area and Zaitz. Both thanks to capital projects by WW Township. Conover will yield 5 small or 3 Fulls. Zaitz will add 1 full to our inventory.

Goals for next year should include improving the lights at Conover. While finding a way to replace or up grade the generator lights at Zaitz.

Fund Raising and Sponsors (Eva Schroeder)

This year we had 24 paid sponsors, 2 free sponsors and 1 sizable donation raising a total of \$9,000. I am waiting to receive the plaques for the sponsors. When I receive them, I will distribute both plaque and shirts to as many sponsors as possible. I will have to send via UPS store anyone not within a reasonable range. I used the UPS store at McCaffrey's last year and got the best price.

I intend to start recruiting sponsors starting in April. I will also use more e-mail and a mass "snail mail" campaign to generate new interest.

Picture Day and Trophies (Alyssa Weinberger)

Photo Day went very smoothly again this year, despite the short period of bad weather that forced everyone inside the school. The photographers, All Sport Photo and Trophy, did an excellent job of staying on schedule and I want to thank all the League Managers and Coaches for getting their teams there early as requested! We finished the day right on time!

This year's trophies look great and offer a little variety from the participation trophies we've given the players over the last few years. We were able to buy something more unique and still stay within budget. I think the players will really like adding these to their trophy shelves!

Player and Coach Development (Cassandra Cohen)

Group Training Sessions

For the 4th year WWPSA was able to offer our recreational players group training sessions with UK Elite. Each week's session concentrated on a specific topic, for example, dribbling, passing, possession, goalkeeping and goal scoring. This remains a popular program, with players demonstrating a lot of enthusiasm during the practice sessions and improved skills on the field.

Coaches Clinics and Training Sessions

Two Coaches Clinics were held prior to the start of the fall season, both conducted by UK Elite. The trainers demonstrated age-appropriate drills and coaching strategies for our new and experienced coaches. The last half hour of each session was devoted to the rules of the game and referee calls.

In September, WWPSA hosted a Y Clinic taught by Rick Meana, director of coaching for New Jersey Youth Soccer. Designed for the novice recreational coach, the clinic provided easy to understand, hands-on, practical ideas and activities for the coaches to take back to their teams. To help Rick demonstrate an actual training session, players from our U8 girls and boys travel teams were invited to attend. The boys and girls had as much fun as anybody!

The F License course held in June was well attended, with more than 20 coaches completing the required 9 hours of instruction. While an F License is a requirement for coaching travel soccer, it was good to see so many of our recreational coaches interested in attending as well. Our recreational players surely benefit from the experience that these coaches gain by obtaining an F License.

This December we are looking forward to offering an E License course. To date, we have 29 coaches registered to attend this 18 hours course held over a four day period.

The commitment we see from our coaches in attending these clinics is a testament to their enthusiasm for coaching our children and their desire to make soccer a positive experience for all involved. Thanks to all of our coaches for volunteering their time to help make WWPSA a strong

program. On a personal note, as I retire after nine years on the board, thank you for making it a memorable experience for me. See you on the soccer pitch!

Referees (Rick Engel)

Each week during the fall the Association provides referees for 34 games in the recreational program. This allows over 1,000 of our girls and boys from the third grade to the senior league to play with professionally-trained and certified referees. In addition, each year the Association provides facilities for classes for new referees to be trained. At present there are over 90 people, both youth and adults, who are certified referees who live in West Windsor and Plainsboro. They take a course each year to remain certified. Some of these people also are provided as referees for the travel program, both here and in other towns, enabling many hundreds more children to play in a safe and fair contest.

Recreational Youth Program (League Managers)

Overall we are looking to increase playing time for the players in the recreational league by a combination of reducing team sizes and the number of players on the field. We did this with Boys 5th grade this year reducing the number of players in the game from 11 to 9 players and having fewer substitutes. With K and 1st grade we also experimented with a dual field format of 3v3 or 4v4 games. This allowed more players to be playing at any given time while reducing the number of players on the field. We would appreciate any feedback on this so we can determine if it was a success or not.

Looking forward we are also considering realigning the leagues especially the older leagues so that players are more appropriately grouped by age, size and skill level. Suggestions we are considering include combining 4th and 5th grade, 7th and 8th, and then 9th through 12th grade, allowing players on the edges to play up or down a league, using older players as assistant coaches for the younger leagues and playing games later on Saturday for the older leagues. Please feel free to provide us with any other suggestions you think would help us improve this program.

Boys K (Tom Raimondi)

This year we registered 98 players, creating 10 teams with 24 coaches. The coaches were without question, outstanding. Hopefully they all will continue forward with WWPSA.

Boys 1st Grade (Robin Dean)

We registered 140 players along with 32 coaches to create 14 teams. With the help of some perfect soccer weather, we have enjoyed a very successful season. The standard of our coaching appears to be good. As a result, the level of play developed very well. Games have been played in a positive and friendly environment. Most importantly, the kids appear

to have had a great time. Thanks to the parents for their support and encouragement.

Boys 2nd Grade Recreation (Marc Herold)

The Boys 2nd grade recreation league fielded 155 players playing on 14 teams. We had 109 returning players and 46 new players. Boys 2 had a large turnover in head coaches as we had 8 new head coaches including Sharon LaForge who did an excellent job with the Crew. 25 parents volunteered to be assistant coaches for their teams. Thanks to all of the coaches for your commitment this season. Field conditions at Plainsboro Community Park were excellent and the weather this season was superb. The level of play increased as we saw a marked improvement in skills this season. Thanks to all of the families who came out week after week to support their sons.

Boys 3rd (Jerry McSpiritt)

We had 10 teams, with 24 coaches, 116 registered players. We were a bit short on coaches this year mostly due to conflicts with other leagues, i.e. father/mom switching to coaching his daughters team. Approximately 13 late registrations which we were happy to accommodate. The teams were fairly well balanced except for two teams which were weighted with football players due to scheduling and coordinating with football schedule. Next year it would be helpful to have the football schedule in advance when creating teams for 3rd grade. A number of players from last year switched to travel. There needs to be a more concerted effort to advertise to the schools for players as has been done in the past.

The weather was great; Sarnoff does need to have better drainage on field 2. Field 5 needs to be leveled. Other than a few minor events the season was quite positive. I do believe, as do a number of my coaches that the refs need to be more interested in the games and make calls that are more accurate and even handed. Part of the problem may be the refs are not sure how to call for the younger players.

B3 coaches on a whole have voiced their desire for the rules to be applied accurately for the growth of the players, i.e. offsides, etc.

Complements to Larry White for his great efforts and support with last minute equipment needs and changes.

Thanks again to the travel players who helped out when we were short players for one of our teams.

Boys 4th Grade (Leanne Bell)

We registered just over 90 players along with approximately 3 coaches per team to create 8 teams. The weather again this year was fantastic except for one day, picture day, and generally really mild, except the last couple of games. The coaching this year has been fantastic. I have seen these boys grow to such exceptional standards and I have to say that the coaches are the ones that need to be highly praised for this improvement. So much enthusiasm from the coaches and

parents has resulted in players so being so enthusiastic, the improvement in these boys as the season went on and good sportsmanship has really shown! I want to thank all the coaches for all their hard work and their continued support of the boys. Without these coaches, these boys wouldn't have shined like they did this year. The parking at Sarnoff started off great, however, it started waning with players being dropped off at the end of the season, with perseverance, I am sure that eventually everyone will understand. I am holding my breath that this improves each year.

I once again want to thank the parents and coaches for their continued support and enthusiasm. Thank you again.

Boys 5th Grade (Mike Baxter)

The Boys 5th grade recreational league has 102 players and 24 coaches this year. Many thanks to the high number of returning players and coaches from last year's 4th grade league – credit given to the league's focus on fun and even playing time across all players. This was a big transition year for our players. This is their first year on full sized fields – the ones at Conover. We played nine players on the field this year with team sizes of 12 to 13 players. This helped insure that all players got to play a substantial amount of time – because we had few subs, and had a lot of chances to kick the ball – because they competed for ball touches across fewer players. We are in the middle of our three week season ending tournament – a tradition for this group of boys going back to their 3rd grade season. We are running a no elimination tournament with the winners playing the previous week's winners and the losing teams playing each other. Our refs have been excellent this year. Parents and other fans – super on all dimensions.

Boys Senior (Carol Padd)

The Boys Senior League had an all-time high enrollment of 131 players this year. There were 6 teams that fiercely competed throughout the season. The duration of the game was lengthened to two equal periods of 45 minutes, to be consistent with FIFA Laws of the Game. The Championship game will be played on November 20 between the Scouts and the Shock.

Girls 2nd Grade (Bill O'Connor)

Girls 2nd had a total of 79 girls come out to play this year. We had 8 teams, ranging from 9 to 11 players per team. We lost several girls this year (and some coaches as well) to travel soccer but the teams seemed to be relatively consistent from a talent perspective and the level of play got better as the season progressed. Girls 2nd are the first year that the girls play with a goalie and the scores each week reflected this. We may in the future want to consider having less teams and more girls assigned to each team as there were very few girls available for substitutions this year. There were weeks when we had to play 6 v 6 rather than 7 v 7. That being said the girls had a great time and learned much

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during the season. My thanks to all my coaches, assistant coaches, parents and players for a great season.

Girls 4th Grade (Bill Kramer)

Girls 4th had 62 players come out, and they were guided by 6 head coaches and another 18 assistant coaches divided into 6 teams (the Storm, Blizzard, Lightning, Thunder, Hurricanes, and Cyclones). Even losing 2 weeks to weather, the girls have had a great time at games and practices.

We've fostered a strong learning environment. Due to a relatively low turnout, we fielded teams of 10 and 11 players each and played games 8 v. 8. This led to several weeks where teams had to share players and the girls were always quite willing to accommodate such adjustments. All reports are that our girls have had a great time this year. We thank the parents and coaches for their support and encouragement.

Girls Intermediate (Steve Per)

The Girls Intermediate League had 128 players registered from 5th and 6th grades, averaging 16 players per team. This blended league worked well and the girls are to be commended on improving their soccer skills as they appreciated the stamina required to play on full sized fields. With just one more soccer match on the schedule, I wanted to thank all of our players, coaches and referees for your efforts and time commitment. Thanks also to the parents for getting your players to practices and games, providing snacks, cheering on our players, and for your welcome feedback on our recreational program. In the recreational leagues, we hope to have the players out on the field as much as they are able, and not have them sit on the sidelines too much. Therefore, one consideration for next year's Girls Intermediate league is to form smaller teams of 12 players/roster and play an 8 v 8 player setup versus the 11 v 11 arrangement we used this year. I appreciate your related feedback; I also encourage you to let me know if situations arise that can be resolved or made better through the help of WWPSA, or if you have specific ideas on league issues like team balance, an always challenging task.

Girls Senior (Tom Maley)

Nothing new to report. Season will end with an eight team single elimination two-week tournament commencing 11/13/2004 and culminating with 2 teams playing a second game on 11/20/2004 to determine the tournament winner.

Registration

Our fall registration this year started much later than normal due to issues with our web hosting company. We eventually resolved them and appreciate all your patience in that matter.

The online registration system continues to be of great benefit in reducing the administrative work required to process over 2000 registrations each year.

Due to some volunteer issues our flyers were not handed out at Kindergarten registrations at the schools and as a result both our K leagues were much smaller than normal this year.

Sunburst Tournament (Paul Hase)

Sunburst 2004 was successfully completed despite a close call with the weather. 486 games were played on 26 fields (17 full sided and 9 small sided), all located in Mercer County Park.

In total, 243 teams competed; 90 were small sided (SS) and 153 full sided (FS). In 2003 the numbers were 88 and 155 respectively. With 12 WWPSA SS and 20 WWPSA FS teams, we had 78 SS and 133 FS from other clubs (211 in total).

Sunburst 2005 is tentatively scheduled for June 11 and 12, 2004. The tournament will once again be held in Mercer County Park. The tournament organizational meeting to fill all the key directors' positions will be held at Millstone River School on Monday, November 29 at 8 PM. A kickoff meeting will then be held in January (date and location to be announced).

Travel Youth Program (Earl Deamond)

As one of the largest programs in Central New Jersey, the Youth Travel Program continued to evolve during 2004. The program has seen modest growth and our teams continue to compete at all the levels of travel soccer offered within the state. As detailed below, the program has had many successes and challenges. The 83 travel coaches continue to search for innovative ways to provide youth with an opportunity to develop their soccer skills and knowledge of the game in a fun yet competitive environment.

As a pilot program we successfully supplemented Goalkeeper training by offering Striker training during the spring. As a result of its popularity, we created and offered a

Tactical & Positional training program this fall which consisted of modules for Striker, Midfielder, Defender, Goalkeeper and Speed & Agility. This specialized training has been well received.

As a pilot program during the summer we offered training based upon Brazilian techniques.

Equipment

For the fall season we changed to Nike Dri-Fit uniforms. Also for the first time, the Club offered team equipment to travel teams.

Tournaments

Travel teams continue to participate in a wide array of tournaments ranging from local developmental level one day events to college showcase level multi-day events in the Southern Atlantic states.

Tryouts

Revised tryout procedures were implemented in the spring. Overall the results were very positive, however, there were a few logistical items which needed to be addressed and they will be corrected as part of the on-going evolution of the procedures.

Budget

YTD the program is within budget forecast. All current figures reflect the original forecasted amounts with the exception of tryouts. During the spring we requested and the Board of Directors approved a supplemental allocation which permitted the travel program to implement its new tryout procedures.

Associations

The program continues to pursue closer ties with WWP schools, as well as training groups / independents. Our affiliations with New Jersey Youth Soccer and the 4 leagues in which our teams participate continue to be strong.

Issues

The Travel Program has on-going concerns with: (i) availability of lighted fields for practices; (ii) availability of lighted fields for games; (iii) availability of quality field surfaces; (iv) availability of proper training equipment; (v) availability of winter gym space for training; and (vi) the development of additional game and training venues.

Comments Received

The following comments were received which the Board will need to consider in planning for next year:

- The league updates have been a nice touch. I would like to know when the need to have snacks after a soccer game ends? Our kids need the exercise not more food in the morning hours. The oranges at 1/2 time are great but I think we should dispense with the extra sugar and calories that the kids are being given at the end of the game. The idea that it promotes team socialization isn't true because the kids grab their snacks and head off to their cars with their parents. Just a suggestion. I have never seen them look for a snack because of hunger after a one hour game.
- Please have registration forms distinguish between volunteering as coach and assistant coach and have people complete the volunteer forms need to be completed when volunteering.
- WWPSA should provide band-aids. Travel should work with VP Equipment to get ice packs.
- Can WWPSA improve Zaitz – yes subject to township approval we can spend capital funds as WWPSA sees fit on fields and capital projects.
