The new wording requires that:

"All ice hockey coaches and instructors of Registered USA Hockey, Youth/High School, disabled, Girls/Women 19 & under and below programs must wear approved helmets during all on ice sessions including practices, controlled scrimmages and coach, referee clinics (seminars).

As discussed at the last coaches meeting this rule will be fully enforced beginning November 1, 2006. It is imperative that as an organization we comply to the USA Hockey Rules and Regulations.

Now that pre-season is behind us it's time to look forward and support all our teams as they enter the regular season. Good luck to all our teams in regular season play and tournament travels.

USA Hockey Standard of Play and Rule Emphasis



Battling in Front of Goal

With the standard of play initiative, players are still legally able to battle for position in front of the goal and in the corners. This may include considerable body contact. A player using their size, strength and balance to establish a favorable body position is an effective play and rewards players who use this skill to gain a competitive advantage. The use of the stick in this process to steer the opponent is also allowed as long as it remains close to the body and the arms are not extended in a manner that cross-checks the opponent. An example of an illegal tactic would include the extension or use of the arm(s) to push off in an effort to create distance between the player and the opponent or prevent them from legally playing the puck.

Free Hand Used By Offensive Player

A player who is in possession and control of the puck and has established body position may use their free hand to maintain that body position. In this situation, both players are skating shoulder-to-shoulder, or the defensive player is slightly behind, and the attacking player uses the free arm to fend off the defensive player and simply maintain their already established body position, as long as they do not grab the stick, sweater or arm of the opponent. However, a player who uses a free arm to push off of an opponent and create space, or uses the free arm to originally establish body position by impeding the progress of the opponent, will be penalized for holding or interference.

Lifting an Opponent Stick and Stick Presses

The use of the stick to lift an opponent's stick and gain possession of the puck, or prevent them from gaining possession of the puck, is considered a good defensive play that should not be penalized. Lifting a non-puck carrier's stick in a manner that does not impede their progress is also allowable under the rules. In addition, the use of the stick to check an opponent's stick, or press the opponent's stick to the ice or boards, is a good defensive play as long as it is done on the lower portion of the stick shaft and the intended purpose is to dislodge the puck or prevent the opponent from playing the puck. Turning the stick blade over on top of the stick of an opponent for the purpose of pressing the stick and preventing the opponent from playing the puck is also allowable. If done, it must be on the lower portion of the stick and for the sole purpose of preventing the opponent from playing the puck. However, if done in a manner that impedes the progress of an opponent, or contact is made higher up on the stick, a penalty for hooking should be assessed.

Diving

One area that has received more attention as a result of the Standard of Play is diving. Although there is no indication this is a significant problem at the youth level, the action does exist and everyone will need to be on the same page in handling those rare situations. First off, it is important to recognize that under the new standard, there is no inherent advantage to embellishing an action by the opponent. A player no longer has to fall down to have a penalty called, so the end result is a player will essentially be taking himself or herself completely out of the play by doing so. It is also important to establish that even the most obvious dive does not excuse the illegal action of the opponent.

Since USA Hockey's current rules do not specifically identify diving as an infraction, we are somewhat limited in how officials can react to this type of action. When an obvious dive occurs, the recommendation is to have the official skate over and request to speak to the coach of the offending team. In doing so, they are acknowledging the fact a dive occurred and are asking the coach to address this action with their team. A friendly reminder that a diving action will have no effect on a penalty being called or not would also be warranted.

Going to a Tournament?

Who's more excited you or your child? Certainly one of the highlights of a young, youth hockey player is getting out of school on Friday to head for a weekend of hockey and hotel fun!

The memories that are made from winning championships, playing mini sticks in the halls and swimming in the hotel pool are all friendship activities that will be remembered forever!

But what about Mom and Dad? It has been my observation that many parents get more excited about tournaments than the kids! Why? It's not just the kids who form new friendships and learn to play as a team... it's also the parents.

If you are new to travel hockey here's a short list of tournament essentials:

- A pair of sandals like Joe Geither's

The Origin of Hockey

Hockey's origins are indeterminate. Indeed, the very definition of the game is at debate. Some observers accept as hockey any pastime where participants on skates use a club, or other wooden implement, to knock a ball or some such propellant about. Others say an activity cannot be recognized as hockey unless it is a contest between teams and conducted under an accepted set of rules.

Amusements bearing some resemblance to hockey are known to have taken place in Europe as early as the sixteenth century, or even earlier. For example, a painting by Pieter Bruegel (the elder) entitled "Hunters in the Snow" (circa 1565), depicts skaters carrying curved sticks. One of these figures is about to bring his stick in contact with a small object on the ice.

The earliest skate blades were fashioned from animal bones, but it is known from the journals of Olaus Magnus, the last Catholic Archbishop of Sweden, that polished iron blades were used in the Gulf of Bothnia area in the 1500s.

Some hockey history enthusiasts trace the game's beginning to Mesopotamia, in the third millennium B.C. These historians point to Tablet XII of the Gilgamesh epic (an ancient text from the area that is now Iraq) that shows men employing curved sticks to manipulate a wooden ring over a dirt surface.

History of the Stanley Cup

Frederick Arthur, Lord Stanley of Preston, was not a hockey player. But he was a hockey father. When he sailed across the Atlantic in 1888 to become governor-general of Canada, he brought with him seven ice-skating sons. They were delighted to discover a competitive sport that was a perfect fit for their skating skills. The third son, 19-year-old Arthur, was especially delighted. He organized a hockey team, called the Rebels, that took on all comers at a private rink on the grounds of Rideau Hall, then the residence of the governor-general.

In the winter of 1889-90, the Rideau Rebels went on the road for a game at Lindsay, Ontario, then moved on to Toronto for matches against the Granites and the Victorias. Those games were so violent that they inspired the first newspaper editorials criticizing the sport as a result of the outcry, Arthur Stanley invited members of other hockey clubs to a meeting to "pursue the idea of forming an ice hockey association." The first meeting, in the spring of 1890, was well-attended, and it led to the founding of the Ontario Hockey Association that November. Arthur and one of his brothers, Algje, then teamed up to talk their father into donating a trophy that would be symbolic of Canada's hockey championship. Lord Stanley agreed.

The official announcement was made March 18, 1892, at an Ottawa Athletic Association dinner. It was made, on Lord Stanley's behalf, by Lord Kilcourse, a teammate of Arthur Stanley's with the Rideau Rebels club. The announcement said, in part: "I have for some time been thinking that it would be a good thing if there were a challenge cup which should be held from year to year by the champion hockey team in the Dominion. There does not appear to be any such outward sign of a championship at present, and considering the general interest which matches now elicit, and the importance of having the game played fairly and under rules generally recognized, I am willing to give a cup which shall be held from year to year by the winning team."

There was still no trophy, though. The job of finding something suitable was given to one of Lord Stanley's aides, a Capt. Colville, who was in England. Colville spent ten guineas (about \$50) for a gold-lined silver bowl, 7 ½ inches high by 11 ½ in diameter. It was originally called the Dominion Hockey Challenge Cup, but within a couple of years everyone was referring to it as the Lord Stanley Hockey Cup, or Stanley Cup for short. Stanley appointed two trustees from Ottawa, Philip D. Ross and Sheriff John Sweetland, and laid down a simple set of rules governing the trophy:

- The winners to return the Cup in good order when required by the trustees in order that it may be handed over to any other team which may win it.
- Each winning team to have the club name and year engraved on a silver ring fitted on the Cup.
- The Cup to remain a challenge competition and not the property of any one team, even if won more than once.
- The trustees to maintain absolute authority in all situations or disputes over the winner of the Cup.
- A substitute trustee to be named in the event that one of the existing trustees drops out.

Early in 1893, Lord Stanley told the trustees to present the trophy to the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association, which had won an amateur championship tournament that ended on New Year's Day. That was supposed to be a temporary arrangement while a match was worked out between the Toronto and Ottawa clubs. The trustees insisted that it was to be played in Toronto, but the Ottawa team balked at that. So that match never happened, but the Ottawa Senators did challenge Montreal for the Stanley Cup early in 1894. Montreal won the game, 3-1. By then, Lord Stanley and his family were back in England and the Earl of Aberdeen was governor-general of Canada. The man whose name has been firmly attached to the trophy for more than a century never saw a Stanley Cup game.
