ABOUT QUITO LITTLE LEAGUE

Quito Little League is a non-profit organization that is chartered by the Little League Baseball out of Williamsport, Pennsylvania. Little League Baseball's official website is <http://www.littleleague.org>. District 12 is our local Little League organization overseeing the leagues in our area. QUITO LITTLE LEAGUE MISSION

Quito Little League endorses the Little League Baseball's philosophy, and has made only slight modifications to some of the rules in an attempt to enhance the playing experience for our children. Quito Little League is an organization of volunteers dedicated to serving youth sports programs. Our commitment is to provide a Little League Baseball program with qualified leadership for children. Safety, training, participation, fun, sportsmanship, teamwork, fair play and commitment to volunteerism are our goals. The experiences players have in Little League will last a lifetime. Little League provides an opportunity to teach children teamwork, perseverance, integrity, and good sportsmanship—qualities they can draw upon as adults.

Quito Little League is based upon the following principles:

- Creation of a fun, safe and competitive environment
- Identification of coaches with baseball knowledge and who are instructive, encouraging and supportive
- Continuous development of players and coaches
- Creating an equal opportunity for all children to participate
- Encouraging a variety of baseball experiences at all levels
- Providing a means for families to share in the operations of the league
- Increasing and improving community participation

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Members of the Quito Little League's board of directors preside over the needs of the league for a term of one year. Each board member volunteers their personal time to ensure fields are maintained, uniforms are purchased, vendors are managed, communications are published, registration is taken care of, rules are established, teams are created, managers and coaches are selected and sponsorships are secured. The board formally meets throughout the year on the second Tuesday of the month, and informally in subcommittees as needed.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETINGS

Board meetings are open to the public and all interested parents are welcome to attend and offer comments and suggestions; simply email secretary@quitoll.org to have something placed on the agenda. The schedule has been established for the 2018 season. However, members of the board are also managers, coaches and parents too. This may result in the majority of the board not being able to make scheduled meetings during the season due to conflicts with team games and other volunteer activities. Therefore, the schedule is tentative and subject to change at any time. An updated schedule will be posted on our website.

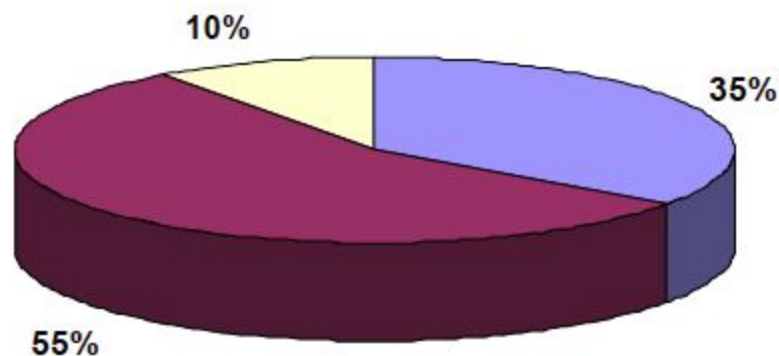

FINANCIALS

The Quito Little League operating budget is generally \$110,000 - \$115,000 depending upon planned facility / field upgrades. The funds needed to operate the program come from player registration fees, sponsor contributions, concession sales, and fundraising. Revenue and expense information is shown below:

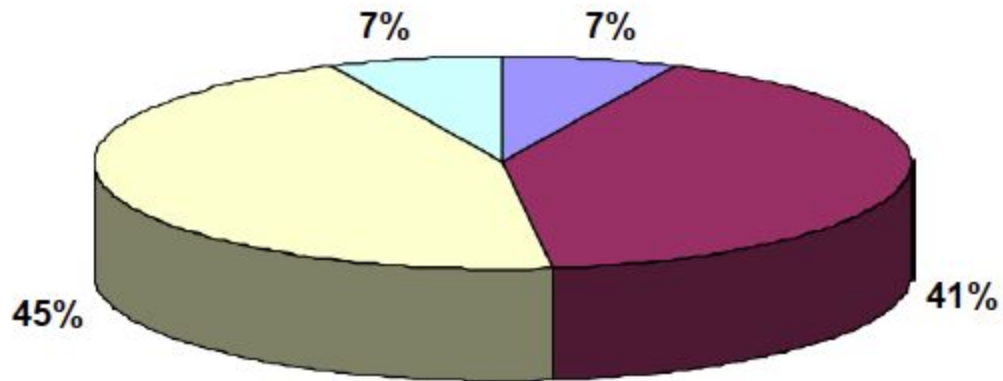
REVENUE

ELIGIBILITY

Quito Little League is open to all children between the ages of 4 and 18 as of Sep. 1 of each year. The league is open to players who live or go to school within the established physical boundaries, subject to adherence to established rules and required parental support. The league boundary map can be found on our website.

LEAGUE DIVISIONS

Approximately 225 area youth, ages 4 to 18, will participate in the program during the 2018 season. The entire program is supervised and administered by adult volunteers.

QUITO LITTLE LEAGUE'S DIVISION AGE GUIDELINES

Age	Division	Explanation
4	Mini-tee ball/Tee ball	All 4-year-olds must play mini-tee ball.

5	Tee ball/A	After one year of tee ball a five year old may be eligible for the A division, however, most will play tee ball.
6	A/AA	All six-year-olds who have played at least one year of tee ball are eligible to play in the A and AA divisions. Most will play in the A division, while some may be drafted into the AA division.
7	A/AA/AAA	All 7-year-olds are eligible for the A-AAA divisions, however, most will play in the A or AA divisions. All 7-year-olds must participate in a tryout evaluation.
8	AA/AAA	All 8-year-olds are eligible for the AA-AAA divisions, however, most will play in the AA division while a few may be drafted to the AAA division. All 8-year-olds must participate in a tryout evaluation.
9	AA/AAA	All 9-year-olds are eligible for the AA-majors divisions, however, most will play in the AAA division if the player has played at least one season of kid/coach pitch baseball. All 9-year-olds must participate in a tryout evaluation.
10	AAA/Majors	All 10-year-olds are eligible for the AAA and majors divisions, however, most will play in the AAA division unless they are drafted to majors. All 10-year-olds must participate in a tryout evaluation.
11	AAA/Majors	All 11-year-olds are eligible for the AAA and majors divisions, however, most will play in the majors division unless they are drafted to a majors team. All 11-year-olds must participate in a tryout evaluation.
12	Majors	All 12-year-olds are eligible for the AAA and majors divisions, however, unless a parent submits a waiver request to have their player play down, and it is approved by the district administrator. All 12-year-olds must participate in a tryout evaluation.
13, 14	Juniors	All 13- and 14-year-olds will play on a juniors division team.

Please note that the AA, AAA, and majors division teams are chosen via the draft following player evaluations. Most divisions, beginning with the A division, will be two year stops for each player. Our goal is for the first year in a division is to learn and develop by playing with more experienced and skilled players, while the second year will offer the player an opportunity to be a leader and develop at positions they might not otherwise be able to play if they advanced divisions each year.

LEAGUE SEASON FORMAT

SPRING BALL SEASON

Spring ball season play consists of preseason practice, regular season play and practice, end of season tournaments, tournament of champions (AAA and major divisions) and the all-stars.

Preseason Practice – Your child’s team manager will hold practices prior to the start of regular season play. Each manager will have a practice schedule and will contact you with the place and time. You should assist your child in maintaining regular practice attendance.

Regular Season Play – During the regular season, each team will usually play two games per week (except for challenger, mini-tee ball, tee ball and A division). Practices will also be scheduled during the week at the discretion of the manager. Please refer to the calendar for season games and practices.

Postseason Play –The league champion in the AA, AAA and majors divisions will be determined via a series of playoff games after the regular season has completed.

Tournament of Champions – The AAA and majors divisions will participate in postseason tournament play. The winner of the postseason playoffs will represent Quito Little League in the District 12 Tournament of Champions.

All-Star Tournament - Upon the conclusion of the regular Little League season, an all-star team is named for each of the 9-, 10-, 11- and 12-year-old age groups as well as the juniors and seniors divisions. These teams will represent Quito Little League in postseason tournament play running from the middle of June through the middle of July. Tournaments may run longer depending upon the age group. All-star selection is recognition of the best players in the league within a given age group, and the players are expected to fulfill the obligations associated with this honor, which include attending all mandated practices and tournament games. During the spring season the selection process for each age level, guidelines, and the details of the commitment for players and their families will be made available.

FALL BALL SEASON

The fall ball season is a non-competitive season that stresses training and player development. All juniors and Little League eligible players (ages 6 and up) are encouraged to participate. The fall ball season begins the end of August and runs to early November. A separate registration will be announced in May and will run through July. Fall ball participation requires a separate registration fee.

UNIFORMS & EQUIPMENT

Each player will receive a uniform jersey, socks and hat from the league at the start of the season. Parents should be prepared to purchase the following items to complete their child's uniform requirement:

- Baseball pants (color determined by your child's manager)
- Baseball belt (color determined by your child's manager)
- Baseball undershirt (color determined by your child's manager)
- Slider shorts (for AA and up)
- Protective cup (for A division and up)
- Baseball cleats
- Baseball glove

The league provides each team manager with division appropriate equipment including:

- Baseball bats
- Baseball helmets
- Catcher's gear, including catcher's glove

Players are also permitted to use their own Little League approved bats and batting helmets if they prefer. Although batting helmets are provided by the league, we highly recommend parents provide their child's own batting helmet . A list of approved bats can be found on

SAFETY

Quito Little League is committed to providing our children a safe environment to learn and play. As a chartered member of Little League, we are part of the Little League ASAP program. ASAP stands for "A Safety Awareness Program". We submit our safety plan to Little League annually for approval.

Our plan includes first aid information, emergency phone numbers, emergency procedures, and accident forms, among many other things. Each coach and team is given a copy of this document. A copy of the safety plan will also be posted on our website.

Quito Little League also recognizes the importance of using appropriate equipment and gear in order to provide our players the safest environment. We should all work together in this effort. If you notice any conditions or equipment that you feel is unsafe, please notify your child's coach or safety coordinator immediately or contact the league's safety officer. We do our best, but are always relieved when someone points out something our volunteers may have missed.

All local Little Leagues are required to conduct background checks on all managers, coaches, board members and any other persons or volunteers who provide regular service to the league and/or have repetitive access to, or contact with, players or teams.

SUBMITTING YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER TO THE LEAGUE

Little League International requires that ALL volunteers have a background check before they are allowed to participate. This is not an option and our league charter and insurance is dependent upon it. Little League International sends a report to each district administrator on the status of each league's background checks, calculating the number of checks we should have based on our league size. If we don't meet our requirement we are in danger of losing our charter and insurance.

In order to perform the background check we must have your social security number, so please be aware that all volunteers are required to provide it, no exceptions. This information is kept by the safety officer in a secure location and is shredded at the end of the season (unless other arrangements are made). Parents not willing to provide their social security number will not be able to volunteer and will therefore be required to pay the \$750 volunteer buy-out fee. Thank you for your understanding.

SPONSORS

Sponsorships help pay expenses of the league. We cannot thank our sponsors enough for the opportunities they present the league. Please patronize them often! A listing of our sponsors is on our website along with our Sponsorship program. We are always looking for sponsorship support whether from our individual families or business sponsors. If you are interested please contact us.

FUNDRAISING

Quito Little League is a non-profit organization. That means we have to find a way to gather income for operating expenses.

As with most Little League organizations, registration fees only cover part of the costs of running a program, maintaining investments and making overall improvements to the league. Thus, we rely on fundraising, sponsorships, and events to help meet our goals.

Fundraising / sponsorship accounts for 35% of our operating budget and is an essential part of our league, however it creates a challenge not only because of the many 'asks' that are made of families, but because it consumes a tremendous amount of resources to execute (planning the event, acquiring donations, recruiting people to participate, etc) as well as adding calendar events to a family's already full calendar.

VOLUNTEERS

Quito Little League is an all-volunteer organization. We have no paid employees; we receive no money from any federal, state, or local agencies. All of our funding comes from registration, fundraising, concession sales and sponsorships, and all of it goes back into our league in the form of equipment, uniforms, field upgrades, facility improvements and training programs. Our greatest asset is the energy and enthusiasm that individuals bring to our league and our activities.

Last year we had volunteers

- Step up to be one of over 75 coaches, 40 scorekeepers and umpires.
- Stock, maintain and sell concessions at all of our games.
- Clean, prep, rake, and line fields throughout the season.
- Create our merchandise, yearbook and maintain the website
- Oversee all fundraising activities, sponsorships and events
- Manage all equipment and uniforms (maintenance/coordinating/ordering)
- Manage registrations, business issues and tournaments.

As you can see there is a lot that goes into running this program. Changes occur each year as we strive to become more organized, consistent and improve our facilities. We have a very dedicated group of people who put a lot of time and energy into the league. This group changes each year as their children progress through the program so it is critical that new volunteers step up to keep things running smoothly. Volunteering can be a fun, rewarding experience especially when children are the beneficiaries. More helping hands certainly lighten the load and help in making it an enjoyable experience for everyone.

FAMILY VOLUNTEER REQUIREMENT

We regularly receive feedback related to the topic of volunteers, volunteering, and the need to get more families involved. To insure the success of Quito Little League, we require that each family perform service in the league. We understand how difficult it may be as many of you have several children, dual careers and other priorities.

There are two ways you must meet the volunteering requirement:

- Volunteer 3 hours minimum per player registered in the league in the snack shack
- Pay \$750 for first child to opt-out of volunteer requirement and \$1,000 for family (2 or more)

TEAM VOLUNTEERS

Volunteer opportunities include, but are not limited to, manager, coach, umpire (AA and up), scorekeeper (AA and up), team parent, team home run festival coordinator, team yearbook coordinator, field setup and takedown, team safety coordinator.

There will also be opportunities to volunteer for special events/activities such as field days, opening day, parent social events, etc.

Snack Shack - every family is required to serve a three hour shifts per registered player in the family in the snack shack during the 2016 Spring Season. Failure to meet your snack shack requirement will result in a \$200 fee for each occurrence.

VOLUNTEER POSITIONS

Managers and Coaches – They are the most visible group of volunteers because of their direct and sustained contact with the players. Two games plus one or two practices per week consume a great deal of time. However, these parents with the available time will find that managing or coaching is a very rewarding way to contribute to Quito Little League.

ALL managers and coaches must attend mandatory coaching and first aid clinic(s) regardless of years of experience. The team's manager is responsible for running the team including practices and games, must learn division playing rules, instruct players in proper baseball skills and involve parents with the team and league activities.

The manager works with coaches, team scorekeepers and the team parent to assign job responsibilities according to the needs of the team.

In the event that you are not approved as a manager or coach, you will be asked to fulfill a different volunteer job from the remaining jobs available or pay the \$750 buy-out.

Umpires – Umpiring is an opportunity for involvement in the AA division and up for parents with less time or erratic schedules. Umpires are scheduled according to their available time. Extensive prior knowledge of baseball is not necessary in order to umpire; training sessions are conducted during the preseason.

Field Setup and Takedown – Field preparation is an important activity for all divisions. Having reliable volunteers is a tremendous help for the managers and coaches, enabling them to focus on the children rather than the fields. Depending on the division, volunteers arrive at the field 15 to 30 minutes before practices and 30 to 60 minutes before games.

Scorekeeper – Scorekeeping in the AA through majors divisions is another opportunity for parents with less time or erratic schedules. Scorekeepers are scheduled according to their available time. Previous knowledge / experience is not required, training sessions are conducted during the preseason.

Team Parent – Team parents play a critical volunteer role in supporting Quito Little League and the team to which their player is assigned by organizing the families for a successful season

Areas of responsibility include:

1. Coordinate Opening Day festivities such as dissemination of information about the day's events (parade, photos, etc).
2. Collect and distribute team and player picture information on Opening Day and later distributing photos to parents.
3. Prepare and distribute a snack schedule by the first game. Every family is required to participate by providing a snack and a drink for all players on the team on a rotating basis. Each family can expect to provide team snacks/drinks at least 2x during the season. Snacks/drinks are only provided after games and not required for every team practice.
4. Disseminate of any Quito Little League event information to the team's parents.
5. Coordinate of and end of season team party and thank you gifts for team manager & coaches

Team Home Run Festival Coordinator – The home run festival coordinator communicates with parents to promote the festivities and encourage participation, distributes home run derby pledge envelopes, arranges the required team festival volunteers and coordinates the teams turn at the home run derby and collects pledge envelopes.

Team Yearbook Coordinator – This volunteer is responsible for gathering photos during the season and preparing the team yearbook page. This is a great job for working parents as you can coordinate your activities electronically.

Team Safety Coordinator – As the team safety coordinator you are responsible for ensuring your team has adequate first aid supplies, takes care of player injuries and reporting injuries to the league's safety officer.

Board of Directors – Elections are held annually for the Board of Directors. Please contact any current director if you are interested in participating on the Board. There are several open vacancies each year as many current board member's children will be too old to play in the league next year.

Concessions Manager – The snack shack is the social hub of the league, a very important place! Not only is it an important gathering spot, it is also an important contributor to the league budget. The concessions manager is not responsible for the day to day activity of the snack shack but rather manages a team of volunteers, each with a specific responsibility. The team includes schedulers, procurement and operations people.

SNACK SHACK

One of the responsibilities of each Little League parent is to support the snack shack. The snack shack is one of Quito Little League's revenue sources and is entirely dependent on volunteers for its success.

SNACK SHACK VOLUNTEER DUTY

This staffing will be coordinated through the league's website. Each family will be asked to work one 3 hour shift for each player registered in the league. Failure to work your shifts as required will result in a \$200 no show fee. No person under the age of 16 may work in the snack shack.

SNACK SHACK DEALS

In addition to the wide variety of choices offered by the Snack Shack, you have the opportunity to take advantage of several 'deals'. On your assigned team snack day, consider these options:

Team Meal Deal – \$40, your team will receive twelve (12) hot dogs, twelve (12) chips and twelve (12) drinks. A 2- hour notification is required.

Snack Shack Tokens – \$1 & \$2 tokens are available for purchase.

Snack Cards – These \$20 punch-cards are kept in the snack shack for use by your family. They are very convenient!

LEAGUE EVENTS

FIELD DAY

Field Day is an annual event to prepare the fields for the new season and make the fields as safe as possible for the players. This will include leveling the fields, filling in potholes, working on the bullpens, fixing the pitchers mounds, working on the home plate areas, etc. All field modifications will be coordinated through the field manager.

The activities will begin at 8 a.m. and will continue throughout the day until everything is completed. The more helping hands at Field Day, the faster the tasks can be completed.

OPENING DAY

Ceremony

To officially kick-off the spring season we have an Opening Day parade and ceremony at the Quito Little League fields. It is a very festive and fun event and everyone should plan to attend. All team players are required to attend in full uniform.

TEAM PHOTO DAY

The league provides team and individual pictures to each player. Additional pictures are available as an optional expense. Please show up for the team photo even if you choose not to purchase additional pictures. Each team's team parent will distribute picture packets and communicate the time and place for pictures to be taken. Parents, please have your child at the site no later than fifteen minutes prior to your scheduled time. Having players arrive early helps prevent delays.

HOME RUN FESTIVAL

Around mid-May we host our annual Home Run Festival. This is a really fun weekend which starts off on Friday night with the Mom's Softball Game. Saturday is the festival and consists of carnival games, inflatable slides, dunk tank, fun food and other activities. Also on this day is the Home Run Derby where each player will be given a chance to become the age group home run champion. The derby is a fundraiser and players are encouraged to solicit pledges. On Sunday we will have a manager and coach softball tournament complete with BBQ. Make plans to attend!

PLAYER CODE OF CONDUCT

Quito Little League has implemented the following Sport Player Code of Conduct. Parents should go over this with their child.

Little League should be a fun and rewarding time for players, coaches, umpires, and fans.

I therefore agree:

I will always give my best effort and try my best to attend all practices and games.

I will support my teammates at all times, when they do well and especially when they do not do well. I will treat my teammates, as I would like to be treated.

I will take good care of my uniform and our team's equipment.

I will help my coaches when asked.

I will always remain on the field until my parent or guardian arrives to pick me up.

I will practice good sportsmanship, and treat my coaches, umpires, teammates and other players with respect.

I will know and adhere to the Little League Pledge.

Little League Pledge – The pledge will be recited by players before each game:

I trust in God. I love my country and will respect its laws. I will play fair and strive to win but win or lose, I will always do my best.

PARENT CODE OF CONDUCT

Quito Little League has implemented the following Sport Parent Code of Conduct for the important message it holds about the proper role of parents in supporting their child in sports. Parents should read and understand this prior to their children participating in our league.

I therefore agree that,

I will not force my child to participate in sports. I will remember that children participate to have fun and that the game is for youth, not adults. I will inform the coach of any physical disability or ailment that may affect the safety of my child or the safety of others. I will learn the rules of the game and the policies of the league.

I (and my guests) will be a positive role model for my child and encourage sportsmanship by showing respect and courtesy, and by demonstrating positive support for all players, coaches, officials and spectators at every game, practice or other sporting event.

I (and my guests) will not engage in any kind of unsportsmanlike conduct with any official, coach, player, or parent such as booing and taunting; refusing to shake hands; or using profane language or gestures.

I will not encourage any behaviors or practices that would endanger the health and well being of the athletes.

I will teach my child to play by the rules and to resolve conflicts without resorting to hostility or violence. I will demand that my child treat other players, coaches, officials and spectators with respect regardless of race, creed, color, sex or ability. I will teach my child that doing one's best is more important than winning, so that my child will never feel defeated by the outcome of a game or his/her performance.

I will praise my child for competing fairly and trying hard, and make my child feel like a winner every time. I will never ridicule or yell at my child or other participant for making a mistake or losing a competition. I will emphasize skill development and practices and how they benefit my child over winning. I will promote the emotional and physical well-being of the athletes ahead of any personal desire I may have for my child to win.

I will respect the officials and their authority during games and will never question, discuss, or confront coaches at the game field, and will take time to speak with coaches at an agreed upon time and place if necessary.

I will demand a sports environment for my child that is free from drugs, tobacco, and alcohol and I will refrain from their use at all sports events. I will refrain from coaching my child or other players during games and practices, unless I am one of the official coaches of the team.

LITTLE LEAGUE PARENT PLEDGE

The pledge will be recited by all spectators before each game.

I will teach all children to play fair and do their best. I will positively support all managers, coaches and players I will respect the decisions of the umpires. I will praise a good effort despite the outcome of the game.

DISCIPLINE POLICY

This section highlights certain rules and regulations concerning member conduct and discipline. Members include players, parents, managers, coaches, any other volunteer or league official. It is a guide for the discipline of violations of the Code of Conduct. The objective of the disciplinary actions is to maintain objectivity in disciplining members.

DISCIPLINARY ACTIONS

Smoking – Anyone smoking on any Quito Little League field or any fields or school grounds where Quito Little League events are occurring will be asked to put it out. Should the person continue to smoke or be seen smoking during the same day, they will be ejected from the grounds.

Physical Abuse – Physical abuse by any league member toward any other league member or spectator will not be tolerated. The offender's penalty shall be immediate removal from the area including both playing and practice fields. A subsequent hearing of the Board of Directors will be held to determine disciplinary action.

Use of Profanity – Members shall not use profanity directed to or overheard by other members or spectators. Such misconduct when confirmed by the Board of Directors will result in the following penalties for the offender:

1. First offense – Written warning from Quito Little League
2. Second offense – One week suspension from all league activities
3. Third offense – Subsequent hearing for discipline with the board of directors

Umpire Abuse – Umpire abuse is defined as repeated or uncontrolled questioning of an umpire's ruling or repeated heckling of the umpire during play. The umpire shall remove the offender from the game and report the incident to the Board of Directors. Such misconduct will result in the following penalties:

1. First offense – Any member or spectator ejected from a game must leave the field and take no further part in that game. They may not sit in the stands or in any area adjacent to the field or stands. Any manager, coach or player ejected from a game is suspended for the next played game. (Little League Rule 4.07 effective 2001)
2. Second offense – One-week suspension from all league activities in addition to application of Rule 4.07.
3. Third offense – Subsequent hearing for discipline with the board of directors.

Equipment Abuse – Umpires are instructed to immediately remove any member who throws a helmet, glove, baseball, bat or other potentially dangerous item in an apparent act of frustration or protest. In addition, the following penalties apply when the matter is brought to the attention of the board of directors:

1. First offense – Any member ejected from a game must leave the field and take no further part in the game. They may not sit in the stands or in any area adjacent to the field or stands. Any manager, coach or player ejected from a game is suspended for the next played game. (Little League Rule 4.07 effective 2001)
2. Second offense – One week suspension from all league activities in addition to application of Rule 4.07.
3. Third offense – Subsequent hearing for discipline with the Board of Directors.

Rule Abuse – Any league member knowingly breaking a Little League rule or Quito Little League Local Rule is subject to the following:

1. First offense – Suspension from the next played game.
2. Second offense – One week suspension from all league activities including the next two (2) played games, and review in person at the next scheduled board of directors meeting.
3. Third offense – Subsequent hearing for discipline with the board of directors.

Other Conduct Issues – Any other complaints of misconduct by members or spectators, which are brought to the attention of the board of directors, will be subject to a hearing with the board of directors.

SUSPENSION OR TERMINATION

Membership may be terminated by resignation or by action of the Quito Little League board of directors. The board of directors, by a two-thirds vote of the directors shall have the authority to discipline, suspend or terminate the membership of any member. The hearing will take place when the conduct of the member is found by the board of directors to have been detrimental to the best interests of the league or any of its members.

The member involved will be notified of the meeting, informed of the general nature of the charges and be given an opportunity to appear at the meeting to answer the charges. In the case of a player member, the board of directors shall notify the player's team manager. As an advisor, the manager may appear with the player before the board of directors. The board will have full power to discipline, suspend or revoke the player's participation.

Quito Little League will notify the parents of a player member of any conduct issue before the board of directors and of any board hearing for review of that issue.

CONFLICT RESOLUTION

Our goal is to resolve issues at the lowest level possible, and as quickly as possible. Resolution of issues related to managers, coaches, players, and parents must begin at the team level. Resolution of issues related to league level decisions must begin with the responsible Quito Little League board member.

Listening to and trying to understanding the concerns of others are the most important parts of the resolution process, and is expected of everyone at Quito Little League.

CONCLUSION
